PRIORITY #7

Option A:	X2: Implement a large scale foster program

Option D:	Put a moratorium (a stop) on killing for certain reasons
Option E:	Expand volunteer program (targeted jobs & shifts)

Option A:	Progressive return-to-owner policy to increase pets reunited with owners
Option B:	Keep intake open for sick/injured/dangerous
Option C:	Keep free-roaming cats out of the shelter (unless to spay/neuter and return/release)
Option D:	Increase pet adoptions
Option E:	Interlocal animal services commission
Option F:	Financial resources – grants and use of volunteers
